COMMITMENT PROGRESS SUMMARY NARRATIVE

The 2018 edition of our signature product, World Population Data Sheet, explored how shifts in a country's age structure over time can have important implications for its economic and social trajectory, resource allocations, and policy agendas. The Data Sheet garnered media coverage in more than 250 outlets worldwide.

The SAFE ENGAGE project's multimedia presentation "Within Reach: Expanding Access to Safe Abortion" was launched at the World Congress of Gynecology and Obstetrics in Rio de Janeiro during a lunchtime symposium with more than 100 safe abortion advocates, researchers, and medical professionals.

The policy brief, "Enhancing Family Planning Equity for Inclusive Economic Growth and Development," examines the impact of wealth- based disparities in contraceptive use and fertility rates in Ethiopia, Ghana, Malawi, and Tanzania on the age structure of the richest and poorest households through 2050 and makes recommendations for improving equitable access to and use of family planning. PRB shared the analysis with Ministry of Health and Finance officials and parliamentarians during a regional family planning meeting in Ghana. The policy brief was also disseminated at the 2018 World Bank spring meetings.

Through the EEDA project, PRB teamed with the East Africa office of DSW (the German Foundation for World Population) to develop communication products to advance national and sub-national family planning advocacy in Kenya and Uganda. The PRB products prepared advocates to engage early in the budget cycle, and contributed to advocacy wins: In Kenya, Laikipia County committed to allocating funds for FP sensitization and training of health workers on youth-friendly services and in Kamuli, Uganda, the district health officer used the PRB video to persuade the district council to increase the FP budget from 5 to 9 percent of the total district health budget.

PRB updated the Youth Family Planning Policy Scorecard, which systematically assesses the policy environment for youth family planning in 16 countries. In May 2018, we launched a brand-new digital platform to allow users to compare youth FP policy environments within and across countries.

PACE was invited to serve as an external expert in a Tuungane population, health and environment project review led by The Nature Conservancy and Pathfinder International in Kigoma, a rural community in Tanzania. PACE co-facilitated a high-level discussion of opportunities for linking conservation and reproductive health outcomes that identified new ways to achieve impact through collaboration and alignment, and to introduce and/or expand reproductive health and environmental impacts of existing programs. Media Coverage on FP PRB-sponsored Women's Edition journalists produced stories on topics that drew the attention of policymakers and influential organizations across sub-Saharan Africa. A Zambian journalist produced a documentary on the country's contraceptive supply chain, and in response, an MOH official told her that the ministry wanted to establish a media desk to intensify coverage of SRH issues.

In Burkina Faso, Côte d'Ivoire, and DRC, the SAFE ENGAGE project begun establishing connections with journalists who will form a corps of editors and reporters trained and prepared to effectively and accurately report on abortion and related issues.

The EEDA (Empowering Evidence-Driven Advocacy) project aims improve the implementation of existing family planning policies and generate new funding

and policy commitments for family planning in response to evidence-driven advocacy by increasing youth advocates' capacity to measure policy implementation and hold governments accountable for their commitments, and increasing decision-makers' use of evidence.
